The LEH's mission is rooted in the idea of partnership. This approach to our work has allowed us to grow at the speed of trust, learn from every experience, and reach more communities, institutions, and individuals.

In 2018, we focused on growing our work for sustained and transformative impact. We launched *64 Parishes*, making a fresh start for our quarterly publication and digital companion. In the same year, we also launched the Musical Legends educator contest, the Gustave Blache III scholarships for Louisiana artists, and the Democracy and Media initiative, a multimedia project examining the relationship between Louisianan politicians and the media.

On the education front, we met the demand for our award-winning family reading and discussion programs by delivering 104 PRIME TIME Family Reading and PRIME TIME Preschool programs across the state. And finally, in 2018 we also opened our 3rd PRIME TIME Head Start Center in partnership with Monroe City Schools, expanding our early childhood program in Ouachita Parish.



OUR ORIGIN

In 1965 President Lyndon Johnson signed the National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities Act into law. The act called for the creation of the National Endowment for the Humanities, the Federation of State Humanities Councils, and state-level humanities councils. Accordingly, the LEH was founded in 1971.

OUR HOME

Turners' Hall is the LEH's home base in New Orleans and the site of the Louisiana Humanities Center, where conferences, discussion groups, film screenings, lectures, history forums, special events, researchers, workshops, and tenant nonprofits all come together to contribute to our mission of sustainably bringing the humanities to the public.

At Turners' Hall, we preserve the legacy of those who have come before us. The building houses our signature collection of works by African American artist John T. Scott (1940–2007). In partnership with the Helis Foundation, LEH has amassed the largest permanent collection of Scott's art in existence.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT The LEH Launches 64 Parishes, a Magazine All About Louisiana

In 2018, the Division of Content launched 64 Parishes, a new brand for the LEH, whose print and digital platforms provide high-quality humanities content all about Louisiana. 64 Parishes builds upon the success of two previous LEH initiatives, Louisiana Cultural Vistas Magazine and KnowLA, the online encyclopedia of Louisiana history and culture, to expand the LEH's ability to reach statewide audiences, including K-12 educators, university and independent scholars, and the general public. 64parishes.org is now home to a multimedia assortment of humanities resources, including podcasts, videos, long- and short-form articles, music clips, and more.

As part of 64 Parishes' push to reach new audiences, the Division of Content has significantly increased its

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social media presence, growing its pool of Instagram followers by 110 percent, Twitter followers by 25 percent, and Facebook by 9 percent. In an effort to provide more classroom tools for K-12 teachers, 64 Parishes has also laid the groundwork for the introduction of new themed lesson plans. The first of these lesson plans, focused on Louisiana Musical Legends, will go live in 2019.



PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT The LEH Develops PRIME TIME Nourish

The PRIME TIME Family meal has long been a highlight of our family reading and discussion programs. After all, what brings Louisianans together more enthusiastically than food? Ever seeking to improve our programs, in 2018 we committed ourselves to exploring ways the PRIME TIME meal could do more for the underserved families who attend our programs. To that end, we partnered with a family nutritionist, who researched the low-income communities where our programs are located — both urban and rural and created PRIME TIME Nourish menus. These menus source all PRIME

TIME Family meal ingredients from affordable items that can be found even in Louisiana's food deserts. We believe that just as every family deserves access to a high-quality humanitiesbased education, every family deserves access to a wholesome meal.

DIVISION OF HEAD START

PURPOSE

The Division of Head Start builds on the LEH's 25 years of experience in implementing highquality, high-impact family education and engagement programs. A subsidiary of the LEH, PRIME TIME, Inc. has extended its program philosophy to direct educational service with its Head Start program in Ouachita Parish. Through partnerships and community collaborations, PRIME **TIME Head Start serves** up to 555 Ouachita Parish preschool students and their families by delivering a comprehensive Head Start service model that includes a developing emphasis on humanities education.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT The LEH Expands its Family Engagement Approach at Head Start

Shine on, Families, our research-based family engagement curriculum, is designed to intentionally extend children's learning into the home. The curriculum includes four core strategies including Family Learning Parties (FLPs) which are designed as festive opportunities for families to practice PEER (Pause, Engage, Encourage, Reflect) activities with their children and receive coaching and feedback while building family efficacy. Alongside the other Shine on, Families core strategies, FLPs aim to engage all families as equal partners in closing the achievement gap, create a shared family engagement language/vision for all staff, extend children's learning from the classroom into the home, and enhance high-quality parent-child interactions shown in the research to promote school readiness. Family Learning Parties (FLPs) take place in every center classroom and are co-facilitated by teachers and advocates together. Families join their child, teachers, and the advocates to model and practice the PEER cards interactively. FLPs are a fun way to get families excited, comfortable, and motivated as in-home educators.



Providing Quality Education Through Community Collaborations

In 2018, our partnership with Monroe City Schools was brought to life with the opening of our third site at the Martin Luther King Middle School (PRIME TIME Head Start at MLK). This site is known for its warm, welcoming environment, and the majority of our children with Individualized Education Plans are enrolled here.




DIVISION OF HEAD START

Children who are effectively prepared for kindergarten will possess the school readiness skills necessary for success; thus, Teaching Strategies GOLD is used to measure the preparedness of children for school readiness. In 2017-2018, based on Q3 assessments using the TS Gold system, 47% of Transitioning children achieved mastery (scored 5.86 or above) in Social-Emotional/Active Learning and Play, 41% achieved mastery (scored 5.20 or above) in Language/Literacy, and 38% achieved mastery (scored 5.50 or above) in Math/Science. The progress measure of 35% was exceeded in all three domains!



HUMANIST OF THE YEAR

Leah Chase is known as the "Queen of Creole Cuisine." Leah Chase is a culinary giant and a civil rights icon. As Executive Chef of Dooky Chase's Restaurant in New Orleans, she has fed presidents and young activists, world leaders and famous musicians. The restaurant served as a hive of the civil rights movement in the 1960s, and remains a landmark for visiting dignitaries. She has testified before Congress to lobby for greater funding for the National Endowment for the Arts, and authored several popular cookbooks, including The Dooky Chase Cookbook, And Still I Cook, and Leah Chase: Listen, I Say Like This.

CHAIR'S INSTITUTIONAL AWARD

Rosemary and Randy Ewing are pillars of long term support for the humanities in Louisiana. Rosemary served on the Board of the LEH for more than two decades, and Randy served in the state legislature from 1988–2000, the last four years as the President of the Senate. Not only generous with their time, effort, and advocacy, the Ewings have been staunch financial supporters of numerous charities, including major support for the LEH.

CHAMPION OF CULTURE AWARD

Roger Ogden has made a monumental mark on the cultural landscape of Louisiana. Among his major efforts are the construction of the Aquarium of the Americas and the Woldenberg Park; the restoration of the state Supreme Court and the 4th Circuit Court of Appeal in the French Quarter; and establishment of the Ogden Museum of Southern Art as well as the Roger Hadfield Ogden Honors College at LSU.

LEH Hosts Annual Bright Lights Award Ceremony

Since 1985, the LEH has honored Louisianans who have made outstanding contributions to the study and understanding of the humanities. The Bright Lights Awards in the Humanities Awards brings together people from every corner of our state - culture leaders from nonprofit, corporate, and government sectors, and is an annual mélange of entertainment, cultural exchange, and recognition of the people and organizations who embody the best our state's culture has to offer. More than 300 guests attended the 2018 event, which was celebrated at the Arbor Room at Popp Fountain in New Orleans' City Park on May 10, 2018. The evening's honorees were:

HUMANITIES BOOK AWARD

The LEH recognizes two outstanding works of history as 2018 Books of the Year. Krazy: George Herriman, a Life in White and Black (Harper) by Michael Tisserand masterfully traces Herriman's remarkable rise as a comic genius. The Thibodeaux Massacre: Racial Violence and the 1887 Sugar Cane Labor Strike (The History Press) by John DeSantis uses correspondence, interviews, and federal records to detail this harrowing true story.

HUMANITIES DOCUMENTARY FILM AWARD

Produced by Christina Melton, Deeply Rooted: John Coykendall's Journey to Save our Seeds and Stories presents the story of a renowned heirloom seed saver and his passion for preserving the seeds and stories of a small Louisiana farming community in Washington Parish.

MICHAEL P. SMITH MEMORIAL AWARD FOR **DOCUMENTARY PHOTOGRAPHY**

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DIVISION OF FINANCE / FINANCIAL STATEMENT

Below is a snapshot of expenditures representing the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities and PRIME TIME Family Reading Inc. Our aim is to provide our stakeholders with current and useful financial data to help assess our full portfolio of projects.

Administration/HR includes Executive Staff, Finance, Human Resources, IT, Office Management and general office expenses. In 2018, LEH and PTI employed 105 team members and managed four administrative and programming locations.

Division of Content includes 64 Parishes Magazine and Online Resource, LEH Grants, Public Programs, Museum on Main Street Programs, and Special Initiatives.

Division of Education includes delivery of the suite of PRIME TIME family reading and discussion programs and Home-Room Teacher Professional Development programs.

Institutional Advancement includes all efforts to establish, guide, and nurture relationships which are supportive of our mission. This includes Annual Fund Drives, Bright Lights Awards Event, grant writing and other engagements with stakeholders.

Louisiana Humanities Center includes the stewardship and preservation of our 150-year-old Headquarters in New Orleans.




