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DEAR FRIENDS OF THE HUMANITIES,

Here at the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities, 2021 was a year of reflection and growth. Established in 1971, LEH marked a half century of good work and impact around the state. While reflecting on this history, the year's challenges called us to pause celebrations and instead focus on continuing to adapt our work and our lives to the ongoing public health crisis, hurricanes, and more. Amidst all that, however, we did what few other organizations could—we took our work and expanded it to reach even more Louisianans. We opened our newest Prime Time Head Start centers in Lafayette and Iberia Parishes, readied The Helis Foundation John Scott Center for opening in 2022, and distributed \$1.5 million in grants to organizations around Louisiana.

As construction began in earnest on the center, we sought inspiration in Scott's seminal piece *Spirit House*. The outdoor sculpture is joined together by a roof with sides facing both west and east. One side, to the east, calls to mind the future, about which Scott wrote the following words:

Shadow of a long day

No rest from working deep into night

Seeking a peaceful place alone, wrapped only in
the spirit

Cooled by the breeze of their children's dream.

The west side, just as critical at supporting the sculpture, harkens to the past and reminds the viewer that "without a history, one is lost:"

Remember to remember whose backs support you, Viewing the horizons of your today The ancestors shadow gives us refuge from ignorance We come from builders of cities, culture, and knowledge.

Scott and his fellow artist on the piece, Martin Payton, were inspired by the African American experience while designing *Spirit House*, but the themes expressed—like all of Scott's works—have universal resonance.

His words find a welcome home here at the LEH, as well. Our mission is buffered by these two concepts: that understanding our history and our past is crucial to imagining what our future could hold. From *64 Parishes* and Rebirth Grants to Prime Time Family Reading and Head Start, our work is meant to connect the past and future, for little learners to elder tradition-bearers. Everyone can find a home in the humanities, and we hope you'll join us there as we imagine LEH's next 50 years together.

PRIME TIME REBRAND

Thirty years ago, the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities created Prime Time to introduce children to quality humanities programs at an early age. Since then, our family reading programs have expanded throughout Louisiana and across the United States, and our Head Start programs now serve families in three parishes. Our mission remains the same-partner with families to help create a lifelong love of literacy and learning-but it was time for Prime Time to get a new look.

As we considered a new look, we thought a lot about what Prime Time meant to us, its audience, our partners, and stakeholders. We knew the new logo needed to convey everything Prime Time is about: fun, family, and foundational skills. The final design, seen here, features hand-drawn lettering inspired-but not directly replicating-children's building blocks, with a color palette of cool blues that feel youthful but speak to Prime Time's adult program operators. It reflects the big, broad goals we have for Prime Time as a national brand, capable of stretching and adapting as we continue developing new, innovative programs that meet our families' needs.

HEAD START EXPANSION

PRIME TIME HEAD START EXPANDS TO LAFAYETTE AND IBERIA PARISHES

In October 2020 the Office of Head Start, through the Designation Renewal System, selected Prime Time, Inc. to provide Early Head Start and Head Start services in Lafayette and Iberia Parishes. With this grant, Prime Time, Inc. will serve 747 children, from six weeks to five years old, through a diverse set of free, humanities-focused program options as part of providing Head Start services to the area.

"Our previous programs in the area—Prime Time Family Reading, our Bright Lights Awards Dinner, *64 Parishes* stories, and more—have engaged more than 210,000 Lafayette-Iberia residents over the last 50 years," said Miranda Restovic, president and executive director of Prime Time, Inc. and the LEH. "We are eager to build on our robust track record of service in the community with an intensive, direct-service model for families."

"This program has been pivotal in growing the workforce in early childhood education, preparing preschool students to be ready for 'big school,' and implementing literacy programming with families," said Stalanda Butcher, Vice President of Head Start at the LEH. "We look forward to sharing lessons learned over the past four years in Ouachita Parish and working alongside our new South Louisiana teammates."


WHO GETS TO VOTE?



In 2021 the LEH launched a pilot of an adult reading and discussion program designed to promote civil conversations about a variety of topics, including difficult and sometimes divisive subjects. Modeled in part on Readings in Louisiana History and Culture (RELIC), a popular program the LEH retired in 2014 due to loss of state funding, the pilot program was intended to satisfy ongoing public library demand for high-quality, turnkey humanities programs. Called "Who Gets to Vote? Conversations on Voting Rights in America," the series was intended to strengthen participants' understanding of the electoral process, historic and contemporary voter suppression practices, the Voting Rights Act of 1965, and the expansion of voting rights since the country's founding.


Through a competitive grant process, the program launched at ten libraries in spring 2021 and was a tremendous success, attracting a racially, economically, and age-diverse audience. It reached a total of 453 participants during 40 individual public programs, and 96 percent of participants said in surveys that they had a better understanding of the humanities in daily and civic life and had a better appreciation of the impact of civic participation in their communities.




















BRIGHT LIGHTS ONLINE

Since 1985, the LEH has honored Louisianans who have made outstanding contributions to the study and understanding of the humanities. Due to the continued public health crisis in 2021, we were unable to host an in-person Bright Lights Awards celebration, but with our "Bright Lights Online" series we reached hundreds of viewers virtually. The programs resulted in illuminating, engaging conversations with our awardees and allowed us to bring their work in front of even more people.

HUMANIST OF THE YEAR (POSTHUMOUS)

John T. Scott was a prolific artist, teacher, and visionary, whose work exists at the intersection of art, history, and culture. Scott is perhaps best known for his vibrantly colored kinetic steel sculptures and the longevity and impact of his more than forty-year tenure at Xavier University.

BEST IN DIGITAL HUMANITIES

In six hour-long episodes, **Slate's Slow Burn** podcast and host Josh Levin explore the life of notorious white supremacist and former Louisiana politician, David Duke, untangling the messy strands of Duke's self-promoting, self-aggrandizing past.

CHAIR'S AWARD FOR INSTITUTIONAL SUPPORT

The Entergy Charitable Foundation has been a longtime, valued donor to the LEH with total contributions topping \$380,000. The foundation has supported

all aspects of the LEH's work, including public programs such as 64 Parishes, the annual Bright Lights Awards, and Prime Time Family Reading.

CHAMPION OF CULTURE AWARD

Carol Bebelle is the cofounder of Ashé Cultural Arts Center, a New Orleans-based organization that hosts and supports programs, activities, and creative works emphasizing the contributions of people of African descent.

DOCUMENTARY PHOTOGRAPHER OF THE YEAR

Abdul Aziz specializes in documenting human conflict, recently training his lens on the modern-day struggle for civil rights and racial justice in Louisiana. His photos of the tense scenes that accompanied the removal of Confederate monuments in New Orleans in 2017 and of Black Lives Matter protests across the state in the last three years document an often unflattering but critically important moment in contemporary Louisiana life.

HUMANITIES BOOK OF THE YEAR

Katrina: A **History, 1915–2015**, **written by Andy Horowitz** and published by Harvard University Press, is an in-depth look at one of America's most destructive disasters. Horowitz finds the seeds of Hurricane Katrina and its aftermath nurtured over the course of the preceding century.

HUMANITIES DOCUMENTARY FILM OF THE YEAR


Director Joshua Bagnall's *Professor Longhair: Rugged and Funky* captures the life and music of New Orleans cultural icon Professor Longhair, who was born Henry Roeland Byrd in Bogalusa, Louisiana, in 1918. Through interviews with friends, family, and fellow musicians, the film goes beyond the music to explore Longhair's hardships and triumphs.

LIGHT UP FOR LITERACY AWARD

Over the course of her more than forty-year career as an educator, Dr. Pat Austin has helped develop the literacy teaching skills of thousands of Louisiana educators. After sixteen years as an elementary school teacher, Austin served as curator of UNO's Children's and Young Adult Library for two decades and has mentored countless student library volunteers and librarians in training.

LIFETIME CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE HUMANITIES (POSTHUMOUS)

Frank de Caro was a nationally renowned folklorist who was instrumental in developing today's vibrant Louisiana folklife community. His last book, *Downtown Mardi Gras: New Carnival Practices in Post-Katrina New Orleans*, was released shortly after his passing in the spring of 2021 from COVID-19.





JOHN SCOTT CENTER OPENING

Our 50th anniversary year saw one of our biggest projects yet, The Helis Foundation John Scott Center, draw ever closer to fruition. Construction of the center began in earnest. We hired multidisciplinary artist Asante Salaam as director, and we worked with New Orleans-based marketing agency Spears Group to develop the center's brand. We're excited to share with you the brand and logo, which was launched in summer 2022 ahead of the center's grand opening in the fall.

The logo is inspired by Scott's work without attempting to replicate it, conveying the kinetic energy of his pieces in one simple-yet-elegant, contemporary-yet-timeless mark. By utilizing the letters "J-S-C," the logo emphasizes Scott's enduring legacy as one of Louisiana's most important artists and, perhaps more importantly, a beloved teacher who believed strongly in passing on traditions and methods to the next generation.







INSTITUTE FOR LOUISIANA

HISTORY AND CULTURE

In 2022 we announced the creation of the Institute for Louisiana Culture and History, a statewide educational hub providing reliable, accessible Louisiana social studies resources to students and their teachers. Made possible in part by a \$900,000 grant from the Patrick F. Taylor Foundation, the institute will train teachers in Louisiana history and in the use of LEH's online *64 Parishes* encyclopedia in the classroom. It will also add to the encyclopedia, producing hundreds of new entries, photos, and media for the site.

Supporting Louisiana's educators has been an important part of LEH's work for decades. This new initiative builds on programs such as Prime Time, which supports educators in implementing the Socratic method and effective parent engagement strategies, and our former Teaching American History Institutes. It's all a part of our 50-year mission to support the humanities and learning in all 64 parishes.

The first institute teacher workshops will begin in the 2023-24 school year, and the expansion of the encyclopedia will begin in the fall of 2022.





PUBLIC PROGRAMS

WHAT THE DIVISION OF PUBLIC PROGRAMS DOES

The Division of Public Programs partners with individuals and organizations to create, disseminate, and explore cultural content all about Louisiana. The division's major initiatives and areas of work include *64 Parishes* magazine and 64parishes.org; regranting programs such as Rebirth Grants, the Louisiana Culture Care Fund, and Museums on Main Street; and LEH-developed programs such as the Witness to Change and Who Gets to Vote? reading and discussion programs.

2021 DIVISION HIGHLIGHTS

In 2021 the Public Programs division oversaw significant growth in a number of areas, most notably in its grantmaking activities. The division awarded a total of 129 grants, a 44 percent increase over the previous year, and reached organizations in 32 parishes. We also saw significant increases in visitation to 64parishes.org with a 23 percent increase in pageviews to 1.3 million total for the year. In addition, the site reached people in 177 countries and 22 territorial possessions, including readers in Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, Europe, North America, Oceania, and South America.

We welcomed Louisiana's newest poet laureate, Mona Lisa Saloy, in 2021 as well. A native New Orleanian, poet, and folklorist, Saloy has been traveling the state as Louisiana's literary ambassador, encouraging fellow Louisianans to explore and engage with poetry.

EDUCATION PROGRAMS

WHAT THE DIVISION OF EDUCATION DOES

The Division of Education promotes humanistic education for and with all Louisianans, especially our most vulnerable families and citizens. Through programs such as Prime Time Family Reading and Preschool Reading and Prime Time Family and Preschool Boxes, as well as trainings for educators, parents, and other caregivers, the Division of Education uses the power of stories, questions, and meaningful interactions to help children explore the world around them, pursue their interests, and become self-motivated learners.

2021 DIVISION HIGHLIGHTS

The Division of Education continued to meet families' needs during the pandemic by continuing virtual programs. Prime Time also launched the podcast *Little Voices*, *Big Ideas*, structured around award-winning children's literature and based on Prime Time's humanities-based exploration of books and the development of critical-thinking skills. Development began for two new book series: Prime Time Nourish, exploring the themes discussed around the family dinner table, and Prime Time Of, By, and For the People, a Spanish/English bilingual book series focused on the ways our participatory democracy shapes, and is shaped by, our shared and diverse experiences.

HEAD START

WHAT THE DIVISION OF HEAD START DOES

The Division of Head Start works with families to build a solid foundation for lifelong learning. Prime Time Head Start serves up to 505 three- and four-year-olds in Ouachita Parish, while Prime Time Head Start and Early Head Start in Lafayette and Iberia Parishes serves up to 747 children between the ages of six weeks and five years old. Prime Time Head Start uses a comprehensive approach that includes preschool education, family services, and health programming, while emphasizing a humanities education.

2021 DIVISION HIGHLIGHTS

The Prime Time family grew this year with the expansion of Head Start and Early Head Start services into Lafayette and Iberia Parishes. One new Head Start center was added in Lafayette Parish, while two new centers opened in Iberia Parish. A second Lafayette location is forthcoming, bringing us closer to a future where potentially 1,200 Louisiana children each year have access to a strong foundation that will benefit them for the next 50 years, and beyond.





JOHN SCOTT CENTER

WHAT THE CENTER DOES

The Helis Foundation John Scott Center is an interactive gathering space that fosters dialogue and cultivates community. The center presents expansive ideas of heritage and symbolism interpreted through the lens of artist, educator, and humanist John T. Scott's life, art, and legacy while promoting opportunities that nurture connections, enhance human potential, and drive social change.

Housed in Turners' Hall, the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities' historic building in New Orleans's central business and arts district, the center integrates arts and humanities programming unlike any other space in the Gulf South. Fifty-one works of art in a 6,000-square-foot gallery space present Scott's visionary approach to art, culture, and storytelling.

2021 CENTER HIGHLIGHTS

As construction on the center drew to a close, we turned to developing the identity that would communicate its focus to the world. Led by New Orleans-based firm Spears Group, the brand development process became an opportunity to reflect on the artist at the core of this new space: John Scott.

Scott's philosophy can be summed up in one phrase: Pass It On. He described the approach this way: "The more I gained, I had a responsibility to share with others. The more I share, the more I learn. The more I learn, the more I'm obligated to share."

As an undergraduate art student at Xavier University of Louisiana, "pass it on" became Scott's philosophy.

Through this lens, we draw connections to our own lives, think critically about current issues, and imagine a brighter future.

2021 DIVISION HIGHLIGHTS




FY21 LEH/PTI HEAD START CONSOLIDATED OPERATING EXPENSES BY FUNCTION
